

RECOVERY ACT FUNDING IN KANSAS CITY AND THE SURROUNDING AREA

Kansas City and the surrounding area have received approximately **\$335 million** in Recovery Act funding. Highlights included below:

- Jackson County received over **\$83 million** from the Department of Transportation for highway projects.
- The Small Business Administration supported **\$47 million** in loans to businesses in Kansas City. Examples of Kansas City recipients of loans provided by intermediaries approved and supported by SBA include Family Footcare (which received **\$406,000**), Prudent Technologies, Inc (which received two loans totaling **\$1,155,500**), and Priority Care Pediatrics, LLC (which received **\$1,768,000**).
- The Department of Education provided over **\$17 million** in Work-Study and Pell Grants for higher education in Kansas City.
 - Recipients included Park University, Rockhurst University and Manufacturers Technical Inst.
- The Department of Energy provided nearly **\$15 million** to Metropolitan Energy Center in Kansas City through its Clean Cities Alternative Fuel Vehicles Grant Program.
- 'COPS' PROGRAM: Law enforcement agencies in Missouri received over **\$19.6 million** in funding from the Department of Justice to support 118 police officers' salaries and benefits for three years, including the Kansas City Board of Police Commissioners which received over **\$8 million** to support 50 officers.
- Kansas City and Jackson County received over **\$5 million** in Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants. Approximately **\$500,000** was provided for Jackson County while **\$4.8 million** was provided for Kansas City.
- The Department of Housing and Urban Development provided over **\$15 million** to Kansas City and the Kansas City Housing Authority.
 - A grant of over **\$2.3 million** was provided for Kansas City from HUD's Community Development Fund.
 - Over **\$3.6 million** was granted for Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing in the Kansas City Area.
 - The Department of Housing and Urban Development granted over **\$4.5 million** for Public Housing to the Kansas City Housing Authority.
- The Federal Emergency Management Agency provided a grant of over **\$2 million** for firefighter assistance to the Kansas City Fire Department.
- The Environmental Protection Agency provided over **\$700,000** to the Kansas City area for assessment and clean-up of brownfields.

RECOVERY ACT IN MISSOURI

Total Jobs & Spending

- JOBS CREATED AND SAVED – CEA estimates that **55,000** jobs were created or saved by the Recovery Act in Missouri through March, 2010.
- TOTAL SPEND – More than \$6.2 billion in Recovery funds has been made available to Missouri – and more than \$4 billion has already been spent.

Investing in Infrastructure

- CONSTRUCTION – 371 transportation projects have been obligated in Missouri, totaling over \$758 million.
- SMALL BUSINESS – 1,478 Recovery Act-backed small business loans have been given to Missouri small businesses, supporting over \$560 million in lending.

Relief to Individuals

- TAX RELIEF – Because of the Making Work Pay tax credit, 2.2 million Missouri working families will collectively receive \$1.1 billion in tax relief.
- UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS – More than 170,000 Missouri residents have expanded unemployment benefits because of the Recovery Act.
- STIMULUS PAYMENTS – More than 1.1 million Missouri seniors, veterans and other high-need residents have received one-time economic relief payments of \$250, totaling over \$279 million.

Helping States

- TEACHERS – Close to **12,000 education positions** were reported as funded by the Recovery Act in Q1 2010 in Missouri – which has received more than \$920 million in State Fiscal Stabilization Funds (SFSF).
- MEDICAID – The Recovery Act has already made over \$1.1 billion available to help prevent additional Medicaid cuts in Missouri. The state of Missouri has spent almost all of the available funds.
- 'COPS' PROGRAM: Law enforcement agencies in Missouri received over \$19.6 million in funding from the Recovery Act to support 118 police officers' salaries and benefits for three years.
